A.P.P.L.E. Member Profile - John Baltrus



I became involved with A.P.P.L.E. in 1998 when as chairman of the Society for Analytical Chemists of Pittsburgh (SACP) and working with Mointa Leavitt, who was A.P.P.L.E.'s Science Division Chair at that time, I was able to secure a grant from SACP for A.P.P.L.E.'s science strand. After two subsequent years of grants from SACP, A.P.P.L.E. was made a line item in the yearly SACP budget and remains so to this day. I have continued to serve as the liaison between SACP and A.P.P.L.E. to administer that grant.

While never involved as formal instructor in A.P.P.L.E.'s summer program, I visited Lithuania a couple of times when the summer sessions were in progress. One year in Klaipeda, I was briefly able to sit in on and take part in the Science Strand being conducted by Jim Brousseau and Sandy Buczynski. I brought with me friends of mine and their daughter, who was probably about 11 years old at the time. She was given the opportunity to participate in the workshop, which dealt with showing

the teachers hands-on how to perform simple demonstrations in the classroom to teach scientific principles. She came away very excited and remarked how the teachers in her classes never used such techniques.

I am no stranger to Lithuania, having visited there many times beginning in 1984. My father was born there, as were my maternal grandparents. Now, in addition to relatives, I have many professional colleagues and friends whom I visit.

I was born and grew up in DuBois, PA, attended St. Francis University and earned a B.S. degree in chemistry with a minor in math. I was honored with the Distinguished Alumnus in Science Award from St. Francis in 2005. I earned my Ph.D. in analytical chemistry from the University of Pittsburgh and then went to work for the U.S. Department of Energy in Pittsburgh where I have remained for 24 years. My current position is a research chemist specializing in surface analysis of materials related to the use of fossil energy.

I joined the Board of A.P.P.L.E. three years ago and I feel my extensive experience with non-profits and especially other Lithuanian-American organizations is an asset to the organization. I am currently the president of the Lithuanian Citizens' Society of Western PA. I was national treasurer for the Knights of Lithuania and served in various roles at the district level, including president. I was a member of the Pittsburgh Lithuanian dance group Neris for over 25 years.

On a professional level, I was president of the Pittsburgh Conference on Analytical Chemistry and Applied Spectroscopy, the world's largest annual chemistry conference and the proceeds of which go to support science education, including the SACP's annual grant to A.P.P.L.E. I served and continue to serve in various capacities for the conference as well as its two supporting societies, the Spectroscopy Society of Pittsburgh and the SACP. I also serve on the Heritage Council of the Chemical Heritage Foundation in Philadelphia.
