## **Message from the President**

### ***Personal Reflections - Twenty Five Years of A.P.P.L.E.***

The A.P.P.L.E. Board of Directors has decided that its mission has been accomplished and A.P.P.L.E. will close after 25 years of contributing to educational reform in Lithuania. As Lithuania was re-emerging as a democratic and independent country, it became clear that a reformed educational system would be key to these incredible changes. A.P.P.L.E. began in 1990, and the first seminars were held in 1991. The partnership between American and Lithuanian educators blossomed, and we can reflect on 25 successful years. We have witnessed remarkable changes and shared experiences that have transformed all of us.

A.P.P.L.E. served thousands of teachers and administrators, and through them, touched countless students and their families. Our focus continually shifted to reflect emerging issues and priorities, expressed through needs assessments and feedback. We changed and expanded locations of our seminars from only Vilnius to include other regions, cities, and towns, to be sure to have the widest impact possible.



Special education seminars became an increasingly important focus, as changes in how students with disabilities were viewed impacted society as a whole. As in other areas, the location of the seminars branched out, ultimately centered in Kaunas and encompassing a variety of educational structures and settings. Camp Viltis, sponsored by the Lithuanian Welfare Society for Persons with Mental [Intellectual] Disability, provided another opportunity for A.P.P.L.E. to reach parents and

caregivers of children with disabilities, teachers and other personnel for an enriching summer camp experience.

The Lithuanian Scholars' Fund was an innovative initiative begun in 2006 to support the participation of Lithuanian teachers, seeding projects that teachers could implement in their classrooms. In this way, the content and strategies presented in A.P.P.L.E. seminars were directly translated into educational practice.

As A.P.P.L.E. closes I reflect that we could not have done this without everyone who has served on the Board of Directors over the years; individuals who volunteered their time in a myriad of tasks including but not limited to organizing and teaching the Seminars; and our generous donors who kept the organization financially healthy. The list of names would be too long to mention here. Since 1992, I have been enriched to meet so many dedicated individuals and make steadfast friends on both sides of the Atlantic. Please know that my personal thanks goes to each and every one of you who made A.P.P.L.E. unique and effective.

### **Lithuanian Scholars' Fund Update**

Evaluations of Lithuanian Scholars Fund Grant proposals have been completed and the final grants are currently being made. The final set of grants are being awarded for 23 proposals selected by our evaluators. A total of 9,210 Euros is being distributed. This brings the total number of projects awarded since the inception of the program in 2006 to 209. The total amount of funds distributed is difficult to calculate given changes in currency and variable exchange rates, but it is safe to say that it amounted to several 10s of thousands of dollars. Without our supporter's generosity, these projects, which have touched thousands of students, their schools, and communities would not have been possible!
