American Association of Chemistry Teachers

As A.P.P.L.E. winds down its activities in Lithuania, other opportunities have emerged for Lithuanian educators to receive continuing education in their respective fields and take advantage of educational resources for their classrooms. In fact, the continued growth of these resources and the ability of educators to access them is one of the reasons that A.P.P.L.E. can end its mission and claim success after 25 years.

One such new opportunity is through the American Association of Chemistry Teachers (AACT). The AACT was launched last fall by the American Chemical Society (ACS). While both of these organizations are labeled as "American" and based in the U.S., their membership is international.

Teachers play a central role in preparing K-12 students to be STEM -savvy citizens and consumers and inspire them to pursue careers in the science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) disciplines. AACT hopes to provide a support system for success. Through AACT, ACS is playing an important role in sustaining excellent teachers of chemistry by providing quality teaching resources in a centralized location, such as reliable information about "what works" in the chemistry classroom, and opportunities for networking and professional development.

AACT has already gathered a robust collection of teaching resources, many of them created by K-12 teachers of chemistry. In addition, the association's online periodical, Chemistry Solutions, offers a venue for teachers to share resources and ideas. Networking is already taking place through webinars and social media, with new collaboration tools being developed in the coming year. AACT plans to offer its first national conference in 2016 to provide an opportunity for face-to-face networking, resource dissemination, and professional development.

The significance of AACT is demonstrated by Dow Chemical's \$1 million commitment to serve as its sole founding partner. The goals of AACT are in full alignment with Dow's STEMtheGap initiative, which the company says is designed to "build the workforce of tomorrow by empowering teachers, motivating student achievement, developing careers, and collaborating with communities to transform STEM education into a driver for innovation, manufacturing, and economic prosperity."

Since AACT's launch, more than 1,600 people have joined the association; some 88% of them are K-12 teachers, and the others are people who believe that teachers hold the key to "Inspiring and Innovating for Tomorrow." They include individuals involved in chemistry education research and chemistry teacher preparation, along with members of the chemistry community who believe in the work of AACT.

While many of the resources are only available to members, there are significant and valuable resources available to nonmembers. Those can be found by clicking on "[unlocked resources](#)" on the "[Learn More](#)" page. Membership in the organization costs \$50 (USD) per year. Anyone can sponsor a member. The AACT website is a valuable resource for chemistry instructors. It also provides links to other organizations with resources for science teachers. Similarly, free classroom resources, including lesson plans and multimedia resources, are available for middle school chemistry teachers at the ACS website www.middleschoolchemistry.com.

Lithuania Considers Military Education in Schools

Elective military education classes should be introduced in Lithuanian schools next year, the country's Education and Science Minister Dainius Pavalkis says.

"I don't think that it would be like during the Soviet times when schoolchildren used to dismantle rifles or similar things. (...) But the segment of patriotic education, informational awareness, civic education must clearly be strengthened and we are taking these steps. The secondary education programs should include basic military education classes as an alternative to the third physical education class or history class. At least that's the proposal of a special panel but no decisions have been made yet," Pavalkis told journalists last Thursday.

In his words, such classes could be delivered by national defense volunteers. "People from the volunteer national defense system should come and share their experience, knowledge, enthusiasm etc," the education minister said.

A survey of 657 schoolchildren from upper classes (Year 8-12) last December and January showed that two thirds of them lacked information about the country's security, national defense or army.
