## **Heard in Lithuania**

**The price of petrol in Lithuania continues to climb.....** a recent survey of ninety-five (95) gas stations in the area around Vilnius showed an average price for a liter of petrol to be 4.8 Litas. The near-term forecast for petrol is now within reach of the previously unheard of price of 5.0 Litas per liter. With the summer driving season just around the corner and petrol prices normally higher during that time, it is not an attractive prospect for Lithuanian drivers.

**An update on the real estate market for apartments in Lithuania.....**Ober-Haus, one of the largest real estate firms in the country, has recently issued a statement indicating that their research shows that comparable prices of the highest recorded apartment prices from late 2007 vs. the first quarter of 2011 have dropped in Lithuania's five largest cities as follows: Vilnius 40%; Kaunas 33.2%; Klaipeda 45.4%; Siauliai 44.6% and Panevezys 46%.

On the positive side, according to their research over the past twelve months, Ober-Haus believes that the prices for apartments in Lithuania have stabilized and will continue to improve in the near term.

### **LITHUANIA'S MOST FAMOUS BASKETBALL PLAYER HONORED**

**Arvydas Sabonis, the legendary Lithuanian basketball player.....**has been inducted into the National Basketball Association (NBA) Hall of Fame. The announcement came on April 4 during the finals of the NCAA Basketball Tournament in Houston.

Sabonis has been an Olympic Champion, played in the NBA for the Portland Trailblazers from 1995 through 2003 and was known for his excellent passing and rebounding skills and astute knowledge of the game. He is the first Lithuanian national to be so honored. The actual induction ceremony will be held on August 12.

The 46 year old retired basketball player was previously voted into the International Basketball (FIBA) Hall of Fame in 2010.

**Vitas Undrys**

**Vitas with Augiene Viliuniene,  
Dir., ViltisDevelopmental Center**

This year is my tenth year of working with APPLE and working in Lithuania. As I reflect upon those ten years, I have come to realize that the choices I have made have been linked to a thread that has been guiding my life.

My parents left Lithuania during the Second World War, came to the United States, and settled in Chicago. I was born and raised in a south side Lithuanian neighborhood, attended the Lithuanian parish school, and then followed my two brothers' lead by attending a Jesuit high school, Saint Ignatius College Prep. The Jesuit influence continued on at Loyola University, where I received a bachelor's degree in psychology.

As I prepared to graduate, I faced a major decision. Up until then I was following the wishes of my family and following the path my brothers took. I didn't know what I was going to do with a psychology degree. It was in my final year of university that I made the choice of going to work at an institution for children with severe disabilities. This decision took me down the path of working in special education.

I spent seven years working at Misericordia Home in Chicago, and then went to the University of Illinois for my master's degree in education. In 1986, I moved to Michigan where I worked at three special education schools, and eventually landed at William Grace Elementary in Farmington Michigan.

At William Grace Elementary my responsibilities included developing inclusive opportunities for a group of students with severe disabilities. I had a great deal of support during the twenty years at this school. Our team was able to build a community where everyone belonged. Our students were a part of the building and their classrooms. They worked and played alongside their peers.

Ten years ago, I decided it was time for me to visit my parents' homeland. During this trip I met with my friend from the states, a Jesuit priest. Father Antanas Saulaitis was stationed in Lithuania at the time. He was very interested in my work, and the stories of children being included into general education classes intrigued him. He believed Lithuania needed to have this discussion.

This meeting with Fr. Saulaitis opened the door to working with APPLE. Upon my return home I found a message on the answering machine. It was from the current APPLE president inviting me to return to Lithuania in a few months to work at "Viltis" a camp for students with disabilities and their families. I returned to Lithuania that summer, and for the next nine summers, as a member of APPLE.

Recently, I returned to Lithuania with my wife to celebrate our 30 year wedding anniversary. We visited relatives and friends, but we also dedicated one day to conduct a seminar at the "Viltis" Developmental Center located in Vilnius. The room was full of new faces. As I began my lecture I realized that the front row was filled with familiar faces from the past ten years. Teachers from my first visit, to teachers from last all returned to continue taking part in this discussion. My first year was filled with nervous anticipation, I did not know what to expect. This seminar was very different. I was not nervous and the faces I saw were not the frozen faces of ten years ago. The discussion was lively, and interactive. Ideas that were presented were taken back to classrooms and teachers began to implement them and, as they reported, with some success. This was extremely rewarding.

As I reflect on the past ten years, I am grateful to APPLE and all the dedicated individuals of this organization, from those who created it, to those who continue to work to keep it moving forward, and especially those that donate to provide the resources needed. I am grateful that I have this opportunity to share what I have learned with others, especially in Lithuania. It is a great gift to be able to return to my parents' homeland, not as a tourist, but as a worker. It seems as though there was a thread I was following all along and this may have been in the plans all along.

A local newspaper from Silute heard that Vitas and Taura were making a presentation at the seminar in Vilnius and asked if they would agree to be interviewed for an article in their paper.
