

A.P.P.L.E. Member Profile - Ritone Rudaitis

Recently, while browsing through some old papers I came upon my resume which stated: "I hope to become a competent and innovative Early Childhood Special Education teacher..." At that time as a K-8 grade school teacher I was seeking an Early Childhood Special Education Type 10 certificate from Chicago State University College of Education to meet the requirements for reimbursement approval to teach Early Childhood Special Education classes.

Before my career as an Elementary School teacher, in 1957 I received a BS degree in Biology from Annhurst College, So. Woodstock, CT and worked as a registered Medical Technologist (ASCP) in Waterbury Hospital, Waterbury, CT. After that, I worked in Chicago as a bacteriologist at West Side Veterans Hospital and later as head of Bacteriology Department at Englewood Hospital.

Having relocated in 1960 from Connecticut to Chicago, I became involved in many American Lithuanian Community activities and projects: I sang in the Lithuanian Opera choir, served as a commissioner of Lithuanian Girl Scouts and as press and information director for the 4th (1972) and the 6th (1980) Free World Lithuanian Folk Dance Festival, Free World Lithuanian Days, etc.

By that time I had visited 45 States of the USA and more than a dozen countries abroad, including two short visits to Lithuania in 1975 and 1976. Lithuania - my native country was occupied by Russia in 1944 and former citizens of Lithuania were not welcome. When finally in 1990 Lithuania bravely regained Independence, I was one of the "first swallows" to fly back for an extended visit. How could I help this devastated land of my birth? It was separated from the rest of the Free World for more than 50 years by the infamous Iron Curtain!

I joined A.P.P.L.E. in 1991 as a Special Education volunteer teacher and translator. For more than 10 years I have served on the Board of Directors. Also, for 19 years I have written and published nearly 100 articles for American Lithuanian newspapers (mostly "Draugas") regarding A.P.P.L.E. input for the on-going Educational Reform in Lithuania. The compiled articles are presently kept in the American Lithuanian Culture Archives (ALKA) and the Lithuanian Research and Studies Center (Chicago).

Looking back I remember how difficult it was to learn about the sad situation of Lithuania's children who had special needs, especially after visiting some orphanages and institutions. However, the situation started to change and soon some of the children with special needs were ready to be included into the regular classes. The prediction which I made in one of my early lectures - is a reality today. Lithuanian educators are not only attending A.P.P.L.E. Summer seminars, but many are lecturing as well.
