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My A.P.P.L.E. affiliation began in the summer of 1996 as an invited co-presenter of ESL methodology to teachers of English in a two-week seminar, that particular year, in Trakai. Irene Gedris, an educator and presenter from Cleveland, OH, extended the invitation to me on behalf of A.P.P.L.E.

1996 was my introduction to many productive summers to follow. The established and popular

seminars were usually delivered in partnership with a co-presenter. I had the good fortune of co-presenting with several English specialists from the USA and eventually with three distinguished co-presenters from within Lithuania's teaching pool.

The Pedagogical Professional Center in Vilnius and its adjoining student residence served as our headquarters throughout nearly twenty summers for A.P.P.L.E.-members' volunteer professional involvement in Lithuania's educational context. Additionally, I was also sent to share my practical North American experience with teachers in Utena, Varena, Kaunas and Klaipeda.

Having been an elementary school teacher in Ontario in the early years of my career, I was able to identify with the challenges confronting Lithuania's teachers, my seminar audience. However, I spent most of my educational career working as a professor and professional development consultant at George Brown College in Toronto. That experience and expertise also proved directly applicable to my seminar presentations in Lithuania.

While I did not need to make use of my fluency in Lithuanian in seminars focusing on English methodology, in the early years I was called upon to make use of it as an interpreter in classrooms presenting other specialties. Before sufficient numbers of local English-Lithuanian translators and interpreters became readily available for our English-speaking A.P.P.L.E. presenters, sometimes I was asked to fill in as an interpreter in, for example, a mathematics or science seminar. Those of us who are bilingual were occasionally asked to interpret for visiting dignitaries during opening and closing seminar ceremonies or at Ministry meetings. Life in the A.P.P.L.E. context was never totally predictable and never dull!

My closest involvement and cooperation with those A.P.P.L.E. presidents who preceded me and who followed me carrying out this unique responsibility - in my case in 2003-2004 - truly enriched my life within this organization: the late A.P.P.L.E. co-founder Vaiva Vebraite, Dr. Phil Taylor, Dr. Katherine Dunlap, and Dr. Karl Janowitz retain their specific image in my memory. The cooperation of Lithuania's Ministers of Education and Science and their appointed Ministry personnel has also contributed over the years to the ongoing maturation of the fruits borne so far by A.P.P.L.E. in Lithuania. My last A.P.P.L.E.-related visit to Lithuania to date was in 2008.

Heard In Lithuania

KLEIZA is big, strong and can shoot.....so begins the recent article by Haley Mack of the Globe and Mail submitted by Irena Ross.

Linas Kleiza is not a guy you can pigeonhole as a professional basketball player, and that suits him and the Toronto Raptors just fine. With one practice to go in Vancouver, it's assumed that Kleiza will be the starting small forward, and he will

be asked to slip into the power forward position when the team decides to go small.

This is a major departure from his first foray into the NBA. In four seasons with the Denver Nuggets he was mostly required to jump off the bench and score. Fed up, he transferred to Olympiakos in Greece and finished second in scoring in the Euroleague. There he found his old game, the one he played in college in Missouri. Specifically, he spent more time down low battling bigger guys or overpowering smaller ones.

What remains to be seen is how he will fare defensively, particularly in the power forward spot. Kleiza spent most of his time there during Lithuania's stellar run during the FIBA World Championships this past summer, averaging 19pts. and 7.1 rebounds per game and being named to the All-Tournament Team.

No matter where he steps in, Kleiza will appreciate every minute. "I'm happy to be playing basketball," he said. "It's a great life. How can you ask for more ?"
