### **Message from the President**

We have just concluded our Summer/Fall meeting, which had been scheduled at the Lithuanian Embassy in Washington, D.C. on September 25, 2010. We were hosted by Second Secretary, Leonas Garbacauskas. He thanked us for all the work we have done in Lithuania for the past twenty years. He introduced us to Rolandas Kacinskas, Minister Plenipotentiary, in charge of Public Relations, and he explained to us about the newly formed Baltic American Freedom Foundation,

which was formed to enrich and strengthen ties between the United States and the Baltic States.

We also would like to share the good news that the Ministry has agreed to fund another session of A.P.P.L.E. next summer and a contract has been mailed to us. We set the dates of July 11-22, 2011, and the general theme of "Integrating Technology into the Curriculum" which was expressed as a need when we met with the Director of the Professional Development Center, Giedrius Vaildelis.

Dr. Barbara Henriques gave a report on the very successful summer program in Klaipeda, and Anita Scarborough read us Vitas Underys's detailed and excellent report on the Camp Viltis Program. Both of the Embassy gentlemen were duly impressed with the reports on our programs.

There was some good news from the Grant Writing Committee. In addition to the \$5,000 received from the Tautos Fondas, \$2,000 from the Society of Analytical Chemists of Pittsburg, we have also received \$5,000 from the American Center at the U.S. Embassy in Lithuania, as well as an additional \$500 from the Knights of Lithuania. Interest has been expressed in sending representatives to the annual meeting of the Knights next summer.

A special thanks to Vida Anton for hosting our meeting in Washington, and making all the arrangements with the Lithuanian Embassy.



My journey with A.P.P.L.E. began with a compliment. Joann Hammer's sparkling amber necklace caught my eye one day. She then enthusiastically told me about her work in Lithuania. I felt her zeal, submitted a proposal and was off to Lithuania that summer.

For two weeks, Lithuanian teachers attended our workshop on elementary literacy strategies, eager to participate. Their appreciation was abundant. We not only exchanged teaching strategies but life stories. We learned about our personal histories over a cup of coffee after hours and friendships were made. Quite impressed with Lithuanians' love of music, I remember reading a children's book about caterpillars when the entire class broke out in song about this small creature. I was amazed and inspired. What a lovely way to build community in a classroom!

The exchange of innovative teaching practices was enhanced by these personal connections. I traveled to Lithuania filled with ideas to share but came home learning so much more. It is not just the sharing of teaching strategies that links us together but the sharing of experiences not knowing that they are common, until we reach out to each other. The Lithuanian spirit is what continues to draw me back each summer.

As my friendships have grown, so has my work with A.P.P.L.E. From Vilnius to Visaginas to Venta, regional workshops have been offered in rural areas for teachers who might not otherwise be able to attend, and I am grateful to have been part of them. Joann Hammer and I developed a series of workshops around best practices in literacy for both Elementary and Secondary teachers. One summer we focused on supporting Special Education teachers in strategies to adapt and modify curriculum for students with learning disabilities. That work led to a summer working with Vitas Underys at Camp Viltis.

Camp Viltis is a beautiful refuge near the Baltic Sea where Special Education teachers and families with children with disabilities come together. The teachers attend the A.P.P.L.E. workshops and provide support for parents.

The Dr. Grigonis' Special Education Program in Kaunas, directed by Dr. Karl Janowitz, is where you will find me next summer. This program has expanded to include a partnership with the University of San Diego, where I teach and of which I am very proud. Every other summer, a course is offered for graduate students to work with Special Education teachers and students with disabilities at the Social Care Home, Vilijampole, in Kaunas.

My first class traveled to Lithuania in the summer of 2007 and returned to San Diego having had a life-changing experience.

Upon our return home, one of my students said, "Working with my Lithuanian friends changed my life. I will be a better teacher having worked there. The world will be a better place if we learn to work together like the people who volunteer for A.P.P.L.E.".

## On the Lighter Side

### Lithuanian beer? You must be joking!

The title of this article is from Paul Hightower, Dallas Craft Beer Examiner, who goes on to laud and applaud the beers of Lithuania. He pointed out that one of the great things about brewing great beer is that it knows no boundaries of any kind-ethnic, cultural, racial or political. Great beer can be found in some of the most unlikely of locations, sites that may seem wholly un-beer-like to our Western tastes.

**So, you like beer do you? Did you know.....** that one brewery, Svyturys Brewery, has been brewing beer in Klaipeda, Lithuania, since 1784, the oldest operating brewery in that country. And not just brewing beer: This Lithuanian brewery has produced some award-winning beers over the years. They received their first gold medal in 1883 during the international trade fair that was held in Klaipeda. The second was in 1927 during the show of Lithuanian agriculture in Klaipeda.

A little-known fact is that Svyturys is the only leading Lithuanian brewery with cold cellars. And such a beer production process as this is only possible in breweries that still have naturally cold cellars with additionally installed containers. Longer storage times in cellars add a deepness, clearness, and mildness to the taste of the beer making it easier and more pleasant to enjoy. ## **Heard In Lithuania**

Lithuania earns first medal in FIBA World Basketball Championships...... Lithuania's National basketball team earned the Bronze Medal and finished third in the recent World Basketball Championship Tournament held in Turkey last month. How significant an achievement was this! Well, for a country with just under three and a half million people (3.4M), they sent seven (7) other much larger countries home early during the course of the elimination process. Entering their game with the U.S. National Team, Lithuania was undefeated with a record of 7-0 and playing outstanding team basketball with new heroes emerging in every game. The U.S. team, the eventual winners of the tournament, proved to be too much for the boys from Lietuva, and they suffered their only loss of the tournament. They went on to beat Serbia for the Bronze medal. For all of their prior basketball successes, this was the first time that Lithuania has won a medal at the FIBA World Championships. Congratulations on a well deserved medal!

"Youth On The Move" a flagship initiative of Europe 2020.... On September 15th the European Commission on Education launched a strategy to drive improvements in EU education, training and learning mobility to ensure that young Europeans gain the skills to match the best students in the world.

This strategy is targeted primarily at early-leaving students and addressing their needs for education levels at and beyond the secondary school levels. The report, "Education At A Glance, 2010,"
