A.P.P.L.E. Member Profile - Vida Gavin



Vida Gavin

I was born in Birstonas, Lithuania. My family was about to be deported to Siberia, so in the middle of the night our family fled. We lived in Austria and Germany in Displaced Persons Camps until we were able to leave for the US. In 1948, we emigrated to the Boston Area. I attended St. Peter's Lithuanian School, taught by the Sisters of Jesus Crucified, and attended Lithuanian School on Saturdays. Growing up I was involved with Lithuanian groups such as Ateitininkai and Girl Scouts.

Emulating my father's career as an educator and administrator, I received a Bachelor's Degree in English from Northeastern University, and I taught English in a Middle School in Marshfield, Massachusetts. I received my Masters' Degree, also from Northeastern University, specializing in Reading and Special Education. I became a Reading Specialist, and a Coordinator for Special Education. Subsequently, I was the Director of Special Education in Scituate Massachusetts, and while there completed a doctoral degree in Leadership, Administration and Supervision. In 1991, I was employed by the Town of Chatham as Superintendent of Schools. I worked there until I retired in 2005, culminating an educational career that spanned 35 years. I had the honor of being the first female superintendent on Cape Cod! I continue to consult, teach periodically at Cape Cod Community College, and assume interim administrative positions here on Cape Cod.

My involvement with A.P.P.L.E. began in the early 1990's when Joe Kalla called asking me to come to Lithuania as an A.P.P.L.E. volunteer and participate in the Administration Strand. A.P.P.L.E. was looking for volunteers that were actively working in administration. As a newly appointed Superintendent of Schools (1991) it was difficult for me to get away. Chatham was embarking in major renovation and building projects for their schools, all of which required my vigilance and attention during the summer months, when most of the construction was taking place. Joe did not give up. He called me each year, until finally in 1997, I made my first trip to Lithuania as an A.P.P.L.E. volunteer. This was A.P.P.L.E.'s seventh summer institute, and it was held in Atlanta at a Soviet-era Vocational School.

That summer with A.P.P.L.E. provided me with one of my most rewarding experiences as an educator. I vowed to become more involved and to return as often as possible. Job commitment made it difficult to take off for two or three weeks in the summer, but I was able to return in 2005, 2009, 2010 for A.P.P.L.E.'s 20th year celebration, and again this past summer (2011) in Klaipeda.

I have been honored to serve on the A.P.P.L.E. Board of Directors, to have served for two years as President Elect, and President for the past two years. I am now finishing up my term as Past President. I feel that I am following in the footsteps of my Lithuanian father, a Lithuanian educator. He cared so much for the education and welfare of children, for bettering the educational opportunities

for all children. I , and I feel honored to do my small part with A.P.P.L.E. as we continue our mission, and collaborate with our Lithuanian teachers, administrators, and institutions of higher learning to bring about the implementation of innovative educational approaches for the betterment of all of Lithuania's children.

2011 Summer Program Report - Klaipeda

The site for our Summer Program had us returning to Klaipeda. Limited funding limited our cohort of lecturers. The work we have been doing on building Lithuanian capacity in our staff proved to be invaluable to this summer's successful program.

Barbara Henriques was able to teach two strands of mathematics classes for teachers and Dr. Gavin offered to serve as her co-director of the Klaipeda Program. Tatjana Kriliuviene, an Expert Teacher in English Language Teaching and in the use of technology to support learning English was able to conduct a one-week English Language Teaching Strand. Tatjana was one of fifty teachers from around the world to be identified for a special award as a Global Scholar by Microsoft for her work with technology in her teaching.

While planning our sessions, we were asked to include a special strand on Computer Programming with C++. Our own Amanda Muliolis took on this additional task and spend a good deal of time preparing for this new challenge.

Sue Kohfeldt also did a one-week computer stand on Google Apps. A second week of the Google Apps strand conducted by Amanda Muliolis was also presented. Our computer support staff, Rasa Alaburdiene and Vilija Tarnaviciute, worked with each of the computer strands and also assisted other strands that signed up for class time in the computer labs.

The Administration Strand led by Board Member, Ed Topar and Dr. Kristen Ross, a first-timer to our program. Both sessions were very well attended and focused on the topics of Ethics, Leadership and Change.

The Mathematics Strand focused on Inquiry in Mathematics Learning and Teaching. Both sessions had good numbers in both sections and teachers were earnest in their desire to learn more about this topic and to build technology into student learning. We focused on fractions, area and perimeter and the mathematics of circles. Teachers also focused on formative and summative assessments and the use of performance tasks and the use of technology to support student learning.

The School Librarians Strand led by Dr. Blanche Woolls, Snaigė Raguskiėnė and Aldona Paulanskiene led two sessions for school librarians. They worked with beginning and more experienced school librarians to address issues related to how to run a model school library that supports student learning. They also discussed plans to continue to build on the first School Librarians Conference that was held in Mazeikiai last spring. The School Librarians are building momentum and I predict great things in the near future.

Our sessions were well attended and consisted of about half the people who had never been to an A.P.P.L.E. Seminar and half who had been to at least one in the past. We had about 130 participants over the two weeks.
